


Asus laptop not charging

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Filtered : Clear all filters (Pocket-lint) - Since this introduction, the tablet PC was something of a hard ride, with the opinion getting into any love or hating it camp with very little opinion in the middle. In response, most manufacturers downplayed the tablet aspect by choosing a high-promising laptop that just happens to be a digitized screen. This category as the Asus R1F gets in. The design of the R1F laptop retains the style of the Asus laptop, with a corporate but attractive appearance, but it looks like a laptop. It's only when you notice the central hinge on the screen that you see it can be twisted around and used in tablet mode. Weighing 2.4kg, the chassis is comfortable to carry around, but you don't want it rested on your arm all day. However, this is an opportunity, as we found, we could easily get 4 hours off the battery, which is a good morning job, which will then allow you to recharge it for your lunch break and then run all day without having to sit down. The pills have tried to lose their lack of stigma and R1F is doing well admirably. If you look at its specification - it offers the Intel Core 2 Duo T5600, 1024MB DDR2 memory and 100GB hard drive - it's pretty much a top-end laptop. If you decide to use it as such you won't be disappointed. The dual-core processor means you can perform multiple tasks at the same time, and we found that it worked smoothly without the fan kicking into life too often. You can easily use this machine as you are the only computer and don't worry about it being too slow. The only downside to the spec is the use of an integrated graphics chip, which if you use this machine just for work won't be a problem as it will run presentations and DVDs without too much trouble. The digitized screen measures 13.3 inches and is a good size for writing notes and sketching. The accuracy of the screen is excellent. When you use a included stylus with Windows Journal software, it's easy to take notes and convert them into text. Rotating the screen 180 degrees to use a PC tablet, the screen can instantly switch from landscape to portrait layout at the touch of a button. Being a tablet PC you can either keep them raw or decipher your letter to the text. With built-in Wi-Fi, you can easily send your notes as an email to colleagues. If you want to use it as a laptop, you'll find the keyboard isn't overlooked. It's a good size and easy to use, with keys filling most of the main board. The Verdict Asus R1F manages to mix the idea of a laptop with a tablet PC with much more success than you expect. We expected high-end specs to offer less than the perfect battery life, but it even scored high in this department. My ASUS M51A series laptop LCD screen hinge broke down a few years later, which is a well-known problem with this The hinge becomes stiff and hard to turn, resulting in increased pressure and fatigue on the hinge base, which then clicks. It seems that the loops are made of some compressed process of metal powder casting, and so it is very fragile. So instead of bending under stress, it just clicks at the weakest point. Fortunately, you can find many vendors on eBay for these hinge parts. My loops I find cost about \$6-7 va-8 (delivery included) directly from Hong Kong to my home. It took 3-4 weeks to send, but even then I couldn't believe it cost so little. So I plucked up the courage to open my LCD screen, remove existing broken loops and replace them with new ones. In this video I'll show you how I opened my laptop and changed the loops. The first step is to pop open small plastic lids over hinge bases, revealing connectors. Turning off the connectors and then unscrew the small screws around the bezel will allow you to remove the lid over the LCD screen and eventually remove the screen (which was easy in my case because the loops were broken). After some trial and error I realized that you don't have to open the entire laptop to get to the broken hinges. In fact, each one is held in a pair of screws... one from the side (straight back of the laptop) and one from under the laptop that fastens the loops to the base. If you unscrew them, the broken bases of the loops fall out, allowing new loops to be inserted. The rest of the work just involves connecting your LCD back into loops (top). You would actually attach loops to your LCD first and plug your LCD back onto the lid and then insert loops into the base of the laptop and fasten them there. Hopefully this video will help anyone stuck in my situation. This is apparently a common design flaw for this era of ASUS laptops and so I found a lot of people complaining about it. However, since this looks like an easy upgrade, I hope many people now consider doing so rather than spending money on a new laptop or upgrading for no reason when the \$6 part will fix it! (Pocket-lint) - Asus is probably better known for its large laptops with a focus on multimedia and style and has left thin and light machines for the likes of Sony. Things are changing though and U1F is a great example of what thin and lightweight actually means. Weighing in at 1.1kg, this laptop sits comfortably in your hand and with an impressive finish is a direct competitor to Sony VAIO VGN-TX5VN. Pre-installed with Windows Vista Business Edition you'll expect a powerful specification in order to get the most out of the OS. Thus, Intel's use of the ultra-low voltage 1.06 GHz Core Duo U2400 means that things are a little slow to load and run. It comes with 1024MB of memory, but you'll see things improve if you upgrade to 2GB. 60GB hard drive Specifications. To be fair, if you use this machine for standard office tasks, write reports and check email and oh, you don't need anything faster, but Vista is resource heavy, and we found that this machine is usually slow when trying to run multiple tasks. What matters to the mobile user is a good keyboard and U1F does not disappoint. It covers the width of the main body and the keys are well blurred and come with good input action. You will find a biometric fingerprint scanner installed between mouse keys that are also responsive and well built. The 11.1-inch screen is 5mm thick as it uses the latest LED technology, so comes with a number of LEDs at the base of the panel instead of two large fluorescent tubes to illuminate the panel. There is flex to the panel, but Asus has added a little more protection to the back of the display than you'll find on the VAIO, making the U1F feel a little more reliable. It's a shaved weight and gives you amazing image quality. It also has the advantage of being more efficient power, so you should see a longer battery life. Sadly, this was not the case with our test sample as we only managed to get a little over 1 hour from the standard battery pack. Fortunately, the Asus ship is a U1F with a second battery - more than 6-cells - and although it adds a bit of weight, it means you can get 4 hours of energy when you need it. Verdict As a thin and lightweight laptop, Asus has things right with U1F as we found it a great machine to carry around and work. It may not be the most powerful laptop out there, although battery life is a distraction from general use, but if you're looking for an ultraportable one that won't break the bank, then it's worth considering. Written by Mike Brown. (Pocket-lint) - We're used to laptops costing less than 500 pounds and offering basic power at a price, so what happens if you increase your budget a bit? The Asus F5v costs 629 pounds (inc VAT) and comes with a chassis that is well built and looks good too. The silver and black design may give it a corporate look, but we believe it will look equally good in the house. Weighing 2.7kg, it turned out to be quite portable and could be held around with ease, but we were less impressed with the battery. We managed to get just over 2 hours off the average board, which is good if you're just sitting on the couch surfing the web, but not as good if you need to work on the go. What makes this laptop enjoyable to use is a large and durable keyboard. It sat far back on the chassis, so there's plenty of room to rest palm, and with a hard key press, we found it great to use. The reason for such a large keyboard is that the F5v comes with a 15.4-inch widescreen panel that has a super-TFT coating. So while there's a degree of glare under sharp lights or when you're out and about, basically we like these screens as the colors tend to be more and the images are sharper to look at. When it comes to graphics, you'll find a special card has been included, but it's only the ATI Mobility Radeon X2300, X2300, is an entry-level card at best. So while you find it runs the last major games and utilities, you won't be able to run anything at full screen resolution, which is a shame as the display on Asus is stunning. Movies and watch TV (you need to add your own TV tuner) proved great, however. When it comes to power, you'll find at this price you get a dual-core processor, but it's not the fastest available, with the Core 2 Duo T2250 being a 1.73GHz option. It's fast enough for most tasks, but with 1024MB the memory may be worth getting upgraded, so you'll see real performance growth. The specification is rounded on a 120GB hard drive and you'll find standard connectivity options for 802.11g Wi-Fi and fixed Ethernet present. The DVD rewriter is supported by Nero drive software and the laptop comes complete with other software that includes applications for internet security and drive creation. Asus' own tools make system monitoring and maintenance simple. You only get a 60-day Microsoft Office trial to use in your home office, so you'll need to add your own software. Verdict Asus F5v is a nice laptop to use and while its screen and keyboard are very useful, it is not the most portable or convenient for machines.
